AMCON sets 15% benchmark for interest rate on acquired loans

AGOS ASSET Management Corporation of Nigeria, AMCON, has set a benchmark interest rate of 15 per cent for valuation of loans acquired from banks and would soon unveil its debt recovery policy.

Managing Director/Chief Executive of the Corporation, Mr. Mustapha Chike-Obi. disclosed this at the 12th annual general meeting of the International Chamber of Commerce, ICC, Nigeria, in Lagos, yesterday.

AMCON was established to purchase bad loans of banks in order to inject liquidity into the banks and

recapitalisation and capacity to lend.

"In the loans we are purchasing, one of our principle criteria is that we would not accept as valid any punitive interest rate attached to the loan. In fact we have a simple formula of15 per cent interest rate. Any other interest attached to that loan we will reject," he said, while addressing the concern that banks might have applied high interest rate in valuing the non-performing loans acquired by the Cor-

He said the Corporation had so far acquired 90 per cent of all the non-perform* ing loans of banks and would soon unveil its debt recovery principle, which would threat debtors on case by case basis.

●Man loses 2 wives, 2 children

BAUCHI— TRAGEDY struck yesterday as swept thunderstorms through Gombe, Yobe and Bauchi states killing 19 persons. Among the dead were eightmen, six women and five children

The thunderstorm in Bauchi occurred in Soro, a village in Ganiuwa Local Government Area of the state which killed two women and their children.

According to the husband of the deceased, Mallam Sai'du Bello, his two wives were grinding coms with their babies strapped to their backs when thunder struck killing them instantly.

Area Development Officer of Ganjuwa East, Alhaji Mohammed Dabo, who confirmed the incident, said: "When we heard about the tragic incident, we visited the house of the deceased and commiserated with the fam-

ily because the man has two wives who lost their lives as a result of the thunder. We have written a letter to the Ganjuwa Local Government Council and the state government for immediate attention."

Minimum wage: No agreement with NLC on payment — NGF

AGOS-GOVER Rotimi Amaechi of Rivers State has said that there was no documentation between the Nigeria Labour Congress, NLC, and the Governors' Forum on an agreement to pay N18,000 minimum wage to workers.

He, however, affirmed that the state governments would pay the new minimum wage as it has been passed into law.

Amaechi, who is Chairman of the Nigerian Governors' Forum, NGF, affirmed that though Rivers State was already paying N17,000 as minimum wage, other states would be able to pay the new minimum wage only with an upward review of the revenue formula of the federation.

Amaechi spoke as a guest on Sunrise Daily, an interview programme on Channels Television where he argued that the NLC had no right to arm twist the governors into agreeing to pay the minimum wage

"Why should the NLC in Rivers State tell me 'we met at Abuja, the Federal Government and us, have agreed on the wage to be paid.' In law, if you are not party to a contract, you are not bound by that contract. They should please produce the document. They have to bring the document(s) where we signed."

The Rivers State governor argued that the monthly allocation given to states is not enough to pay for the wage, noting that labour is not being fair to the governors.

He further argued that though the state governors are bound by law to pay the minimum wage, only a review of the revenue formula would afford state govern-

ments the opportunity to pay. On what the solutions are he said: "We think the workers will get their N18,000, we think the Federal Government will give fiscal federalism, in the short term; we can make do with a review of the revenue formula that gives more money to state governors. We are looking at 40 per cent."
