

Yari's security aide dies in accident with camel

GUSAU—HEAD of the Special Protection Unit of Governor AbdulAziz Yari of Zamfara State, Mr. Ado Yahaya, a police officer, died in an accident involving the governor's convoy and a camel on Gummi-Sokoto Road, Sunday.

Five other policemen sustained injuries.

Director of Press and Communication to the Governor, Alhaji Nuhu Anka, in a statement, yesterday, said the accident occurred when the governor's convoy was returning from Talata Mafara, after a road inspection visit in Gummi.

He said the governor had instructed that the corpse be conveyed to Gusau for funeral rites, while the injured policemen were admitted at the Federal Medical Centre, Gusau.

Anka added that those who sustained fractures had been referred to the National Orthopaedic Hospital, Kano.

KADUNA and Yobe states have relaxed the curfew imposed in the states as calm seem to be returning gradually in Kaduna metropolis and Damaturu, the state capitals, respectively.

A statement by Governor Patrick Yakowa of Kaduna State's Media aide, Mr Rueben Buhari, said: "After serious deliberations Kaduna State Security Council has reviewed the curfew hours as follows: for today (yesterday), people can move freely from 12 noon to 4pm.

"For tomorrow (today) people in Kaduna North Kaduna South, Igabi and Chikun local government areas can move freely from 7am to 4pm.

"For the remaining 19 local governments, people can move from 6am to 6pm
