"But at 11p.m., the prayer ended and the prophet left for his home, but suddenly, one Reverend Rose started shouting that Abiodu was dying. The prophet was called back and holy water was sprinkled on the woman, who was unconscious," adding that the woman was rushed to Central Hospital, Agbor, where she was confirmed dead.

"As I speak, both the prophet and the landlord of the prayer have been arrested while investigation is in progress."
