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One of abducted 6 sisters in Abuja dies in captivity

ABUJA—With the reported killing of one of the six girls kidnapped last week with their father in Bwari Area Council of the Federal Capital Territory, Abuja, the Police at Force Headquarters says it has initiated a comprehensive plan of action towards checkmating bandits' attacks

The six sisters and their father were reportedly kidnapped and their father was later released to get the sum of N60 million ransom for their release.

But, one of the six daughters was reportedly killed by the bandits who dumped her body for the parents of the girl, with the kidnappers writing the family, threatening to kill more of the girls, if the ransom of N60 million was not paid.

Speaking on the abduction, the Force Public Relations Officer, ACP Muyiwa Adejobi, in a statement said: "The Force Headquarters is diligently coordinating efforts

to address this and prevent any further occurrence, as all hands are on deck to rescue the victims.

"However, the sensitivity of the situation necessitates discretion and as a result, specific details are being kept confidential to avoid compromising ongoing operations.

"The NPF is actively engaging and contacting individuals crucial to the rescue operations and investigation.

"The objective is not only to bring perpetrators to justice but also to intensify efforts in rescue operations for victims still in

captivity.

"Furthermore, recognising the psychological impact on affected families, the Police are encouraging open communication with their operatives to provide support, information, and assistance to mitigate the psychological warfare imposed by kidnappers on the relatives and loved ones of their victims."

It will be recalled that since December 2023, no week has passed without reports of bandits attacks and kidnappings, particularly in communities bordering Kaduna, Niger, Nasarawa and Kogi states

Remote communities like Kuduru, Gbaupe, Katari, Kawu, Arab Road in Kabwa, Dei-Dei and some in Kuje have been worse hit.
