Despite multiple security checkpoints, bandits have intensified their attacks on vehicles traveling along the route. Last Sunday, an

attack on the road left the head of the Zamfara Askarawa (Security Outfit's vigilantes), General Lawal Muhammad (retired), injured and receiving treatment in the hospital. Additionally, nine vigilantes were

killed in an ambush at Tsafe last week.

Locals have expressed their fear, stating that bandits attack daily, sometimes multiple times a day. "The bandits have been attacking, and some days they attack more than once. This has made people afraid, and they have to pray hard when traveling on the road because a person could easily be killed," said one community member. He further described how bandits would stop moving vehicles, start shooting sporadically, kidnap passengers, and take them into the forest.

is a major route connecting Zamfara. Kebbi, Sokoto, Katsina, and parts of Niger Republic. Despite authorities' claims of efforts to end the attacks, the situation persists.

In an interview with Hausa Service of the BBC, Governor Dauda Lawal of Zamfara State, he confirmed the attack on the vigilantes and assured that his government would not be deterred in the fight against bandits. "What happened would not frighten us, and would not stop us from what we are doing to ensure that peace is restored in Zamfara State," he said.
